### Morningside Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends Minutes of the Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business

Morningside Meeting  
Ministry and Counsel Report  
April 2, 2017

1. The Meeting began with worship at 12:25 p.m., and Pamela Wood read from Paul’s Letter to the Corinthians, which was also followed by silent worship:

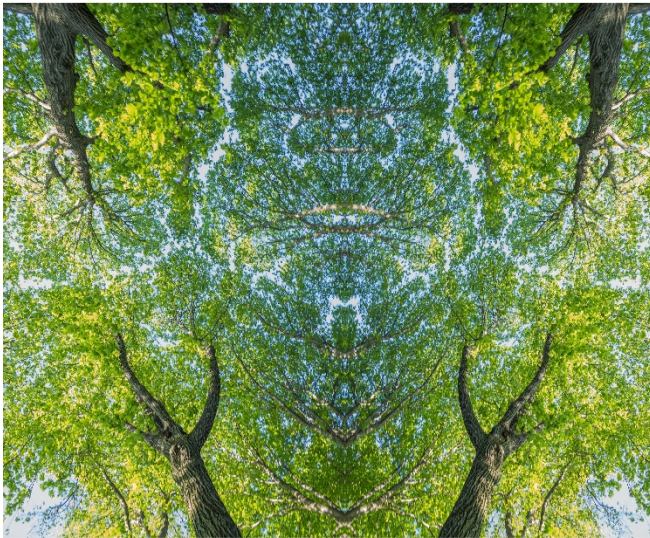

## Look Up!

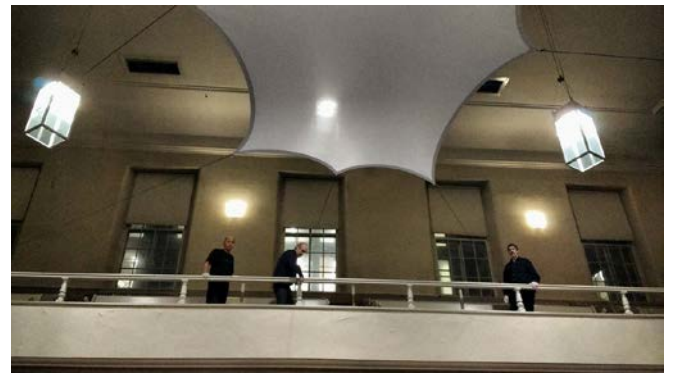


A few years ago, on a lovely summer morning, I was resting after a work out on a park bench. As I looked up into the leafy brocade above my head, I began to see patterns and sky rivers opened up in between where leaves on one tree ended and another began, in that negative space filled with blue sky.

I was so mesmerized and transported by this I began, with the help of my partner, Steve Soblick on the technical end of things, to photograph this stand of Linden Trees in that park, Fort Tryon's Linden Terrace for over a year during the equinox and solstice of each season. Always greeting the early morning light, we began to become familiar with the under canopy as we would the topography of a map.

This became the basis for an installation called, 'Look Up! Visions from Under the Canopy.' The images and video from under the canopy of linden trees through all seasons were projected on a screen hung parallel to the ceiling hung in the 15th St. Meeting House meeting room last Feb. 18th for a day. People viewed it

by laying down on the carpeted floor or the benches we had arranged in a circle around the meeting room. Individual still tree portraits arranged in a mandala like formation stood on a bench to the side as a kind of sitting meditation space. The Common Room hosted concurrent screenings of a short documentary featuring naturalist and author, Leslie Day, <https://youtu.be/J50S-Uw8pfc> and a documentary about the interconnected lives of trees called, 'Mother Tree' by Dan McKinney, <https://youtu.be/-8SORM4dYG8>.



This is my message. Interconnection. We are all interconnected and the trees teach us that. They show us how to live. In their tree communities, they come to one another's aid through their roots and fungi underground, "social networks."

Here is the poem that Leslie Day shares in the film. It's by John Moffit:

To look at any thing,  
If you would know that thing,  
You must look at it long:  
To look at this green and say,  
"I have seen spring in these  
Woods," will not do – you must  
Be the thing you see:

You must be the dark snakes of  
Stems and ferny plumes of leaves,  
You must enter in  
To the small silences between

The leaves,  
You must take your time  
And touch the very peace  
They issue from.

### FCNL Capital Campaign: The World We Seek – We Can Live It

Friends' transformative and radical faith to "try what love can do" is given voice in Washington through the Friends Committee on National Legislation. As FCNL nears 75 years of faithful witness, it is planning to expand its presence on Capitol Hill. On April 8, FCNL's executive secretary, Diane Randall, spoke to New York Friends about FCNL's five-year capital campaign. The campaign is aimed at providing funding for:

- Investing in the future. The bulk of the money will be used to build an endowment to guarantee the sustainability of Young Adult programs that will ensure that Friends' values help shape public policy for years to come. The programs include the Young Fellows program (1-year fellowships), summer internships, the Advocacy Corps (training and support for young activists), and the Spring Lobby Weekend, which brings hundreds of young people to Washington to lobby their elected representatives.
- Sustainable funding for lobbying (contributions to which are not tax-deductible), training constituents to lobby and providing them with materials.
- The Friend in Washington Program. This program makes it possible for Friends with special expertise to live in Washington for a period from a month to two years to contribute to FCNL's lobbying.
- The Quaker Welcome Center, a LEED certified, net-zero carbon building, for use in education and advocacy training. The Center will also provide an

expanded meeting space for policymakers across the political spectrum to gather.
